2020 Census Data Available

The US Census Bureau recently released data from the 2020 Census. A variety of useful interpretive maps and charts have been developed by the Vermont Center for Geographic Information, available at: US Census Data—Vermont. The population of the Bennington region remained relatively constant, with significant increases in some towns including Arlington, Sunderland, Peru, and Doset, and declines in other towns, particularly in the southern part of the county. Additional details, including data on villages in our region, will be available soon.

UVM Students Complete Summer Internships with BCRC

Two University of Vermont students completed internship projects, working under the direction of BCRC staff. Each of the projects was designed to provide useful information to support municipal planning work in communities around the region.

Vance Canella conducted an inventory of the availability of sidewalks in villages and adjacent residential neighborhoods. He noted that sidewalks "...promote safe travel for pedestrians, help to reduce carbon emissions, and can even help to create a sense of community..." and found that quite a few areas with high densities of housing are lacking this important piece of infrastructure. Rachel Whittelsly completed an assessment of the degree to which existing buildings and lots conform to zoning dimensional standards in all of the village centers in the region. The analysis showed areas where lot sizes, front, side, and rear setbacks, and other conditions were consistently out of sync with regulatory standards. The research will be particularly beneficial as BCRC staff work with many local planning commissions to develop amendments to land use bylaws that bring them more into alignment with historic development patterns while supporting desired housing densities and the physical characteristics of walkable village centers. Southern Vermont Economy Summit Recordings and Reflections Now Available

In May the Southern Vermont Economy Summit was held virtually over three days with 168 attendees. We gather each year to learn from one another, and from people like Majora Carter and Xusana Davis, two of the keynote speakers at the summit, who have been creating new solutions to the kinds of challenges we are taking on here in southern Vermont.

This year's Summit began with a Brookings Institution scholar who gave us the big picture on rural policy, including what a new era of rural investment could mean for our communities. In the lunch series, we met new Vermonters and learned about who they are, why they are here, what's working, and how we can all play a bigger role in welcoming newcomers.

We met people from fascinating businesses that we never knew existed and found out that even when we're talking about locally owned and operated businesses, an enormous amount of their revenues and our economy comes from selling products and services outside the state.

We met people from other communities who were making small-scale changes that are having long-lasting positive impacts on their community's arts and culture, diversity, planning, and social capital.

The Summit closed with the inspiration of the one and only Majora Carter who says "Nobody should have to move out of their neighborhood to live in a better one!"

<u>Energy Action Network Summit</u> - September 15, 2021. The Annual EAN Network Summit brings together <u>EAN's Network Members and Public Partners</u>, including leaders in the non-profit, utility, business, higher education, and finance sectors, along with Vermont legislators, leaders in State government, representatives from Vermont's federal delegation, philanthropists, and other thought leaders. The Summit is a key moment each year to connect, strategize, and learn from one another. The 2021 Summit agenda will include:

- Updates on VT's progress towards our climate commitments and energy goals, including the work of the Climate Council and Comprehensive Energy Plan, and on legislation;
- A focus on centering equity in energy and climate work;
- Updates on the Network Action Teams that came out of winning pitches at the 2020 Summit;

VTrans Announces FY2022 Grant Funding for Municipal Highway and Stormwater Mitigation

Grants funded through this program must have a transportation link; eligible projects include any environmental mitigation activity, including pollution prevention and pollution abatement activities and mitigation to address stormwater management, control, and water pollution prevention or abatement related to highway construction or due to highway runoff. Possible projects include planning studies (stormwater inventories, low restoration plans, phosphorus control planning), salt/sand sheds, bank stabilization, culvert replacement/re-sizing, stream bank stabilization, detention ponds, check dam, swirl separators, permeable pavers, infiltration basins, gravel wetlands, subsurface detention systems, bio filters, and bio retention systems.

Eligible applicants for this grant program are municipalities. There is not a program cap on the amount of funding granted to a specific project, though there is a 20% local match requirement. All projects must be developed in accordance with applicable federal and state regulations. Bylaw Modernization Grants: The Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) has \$500,000 available to grant to municipalities for land use, development, and zoning bylaw updates in support of pedestrian-oriented development patterns that increase housing choice and affordability within smart growth areas, and in accordance with Vermont's smart growth principles (24 V.S.A. §2791). This one-time funding from Act 74 (2021) is intended to help communities confront the State's housing shortage and ready areas for new homes through bylaw modernization. A town or village may apply for Bylaw Modernization Grant funding in addition to a recent or FY22 Municipal Planning Grant. Information about eligibility, funding, and competitive criteria can be found in the program description. The BCRC will work with interested municipalities to develop a single grant application that will provide funding for multiple bylaw updates; contact Cat Bryars at the BCRC for more information.

2021 Municipal Planning Grants - Municipalities may apply for up to \$22,000 and joint applications from several municipalities (a consortium) may apply for up to \$35,000. A wide range of municipal planning and implementation activities are eligible for funding. For this funding year, ACCD has identified four priority areas:

- ◆ COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plans and/or Investment;
- ◆ Fair & Affordable Housing Plans and/or Regulations that Implement Enabling Better Places: A Zoning Guide for Vermont Neighborhoods;
- ♦ Plans for a NEW Designated Area or Visual/Physical Master Planning for a Designated Area;
- ♦ Innovative Statewide Model Project.

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) and Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

programs. For both programs, the application period opens September 30, 2021 with a state deadline of Friday December 17, 2021.

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC):

- Eligible Applicants: State agencies, regional planning commissions, and municipalities. Municipalities must have an approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plan at the time of application submittal.
- Funding Available: \$1,000,000 (federal share) set-aside for Vermont with up to \$500,000 available for
 planning activities. Up to \$50 million is available per sub-application for nationally competitive mitigation
 projects.
- Eligible Projects: Everything that was previously eligible will still be eligible, e.g., home buyouts, floodplain restoration, culvert projects, Local Hazard Mitigation Planning grants, etc. In addition, under BRIC, applicants can apply for Project Scoping or Direct Technical Assistance.
- Management Costs: 5% of total project costs will be available to sub-applicants for managing the grant award.

Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA):

- FMA funds must benefit an NFIP-participating community; ideally those with Repetitive Loss/Severe Repetitive Loss properties.
- Up to \$900,000 is available per State for project scoping to develop community flood mitigation projects that reduce future NFIP flood claims.
- Up to \$70 million can be applied for per sub-applicant for Community Flood Mitigation Projects to address community flood risk to reduce future NFIP flood claims.

<u>Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) for COVID, DR-4532</u>: President Biden has authorized FEMA to provide the State of Vermont funding through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) for the major disaster declared for the COVID-19 pandemic. The contribution for the State of Vermont is \$13,396,387. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis, more information on a grant deadline coming soon.

Flood Resilient Communities Fund (FRCF): The Flood Resilient Communities Fund (FRCF) is currently under development, subject to approval by the Agency of Administration. This fund was established by the Vermont Legislature under Act 74 with the intent of improving landscape and community resilience and reducing the future public safety and water quality impacts of climate-related flood hazards in Vermont, focusing on buyouts of flood-vulnerable properties. This program will prioritize projects that are not eligible for FEMA funding, more details coming soon. Round one of applications anticipated in October 2021 and round two January 2022. Available funding is \$4.6 million in fiscal year 2022.
